Chairperson's Report - Dr Juliet Waterkeyn



It is ironic that as a result of the pandemic, 2020-2021 were the best years since our foundation. Africa AHEAD has really come of age, and is now a fully fledged local organisation but one which is at the cutting edge of community development, and on a par with many international NGOs. Our team is working throughout the country, using our Community Health Club (CHC) methodology effectively at scale, demonstrating the power of our people-centered CHC approach.



Hygiene promotion has been our key expertise for two decades which meant that when the pandemic struck we were the 'go to' organisation, quickly set up handwashing stations to minimise the spread of Covid from the urban to the rural areas, with readymade training materials and health clubs, and at last scale up the outreach using Radio to spread the message. We also had the human resources to undertake a range of infrastructure projects including rehabilitation of health centre facilities, rural and urban boreholes to ensure clean water with powered piped water schemes.

Since Regis Matimati became Executive Director in 2019, he has transformed the organisation with a tenfold increase in personnel, and we now have 8 offices across the country, and 19 large projects and a team of highly qualified professionals. I am happy to see we are achieving gender equity with 42% of positions being filled by capable women not only in management but in male-dominated roles as drivers. With the excellent coordination skills of Aggippa Chingono, Head of Programmes, and Patience Muserepwa, Head of Finance & Admin, the organisation met all targets in the field as well as achieving full donor compliance and three years of unconditional approval by our auditors which has encouraged Unicef to sign a long term agreement with us. On behalf of the Board, I congratulate Regis for his team's supreme efforts which could be attributed in part to the caring culture I notice within the organisation, whereby Africa AHEAD staff are considered a family; where they are expected to be committed to dedicated service of the community as a way of life, where employment is not just a job.



Executive Director's Report - Regis Matimati



The years 2020 and 2021 saw positive growth for the organization in terms of our increased capacity, and development.

Our interventions reached over **2.2 million beneficiaries** over the two years with a revenue of **US\$ 2,113,108 in 2021 and US\$1,490,352 in 2020** with a total revenue of **US\$ 3,603,460** over the two years.



Our staff grew to 50 staff members comprising of public health experts, public health engineers, accountants and logisticians. I am humbled to have held the torch charting the course for this group of dedicated and selfless experts.

The two years went like a song. I could not falter given the liberal support I got from my four pillars in Programs, Finance and Administration, Logistics and Supply as well as Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability and Learning leads.

Across the country the organization achieved amazing targets as articulated in this report. I respect the efforts of the team and the coordination and technical support they got from the development partners in the field, the stakeholders and program participants across the country.

We continued to enjoy support and capacity building from our international partners namely ACF, Oxfam, Care International, SKAT Foundation and UNICEF. We will continually engage others so that we are always available to serve the communities of Zimbabwe.

The organization continues to sit in national and regional think-tanks to chart the way for Zimbabwe. National WASH has appointed Africa AHEAD the Lead Focal Agency in Bulawayo and Matebeland North Province, the only organisation in the country to be given this responsibility of co-ordinating other non-governmental organisations in two provinces.

Resultantly the National WASH also saw it fit to appoint Africa AHEAD as

- i) Co-Chair with Oxfam of the WASH Technical Working Group
- ii) Local NGO representatives for the Sanitation and Water For All (SWA)
- iii) Local NGO representative for the WASH in Schools Strategy Team.

I pay tribute to the support I got from the Board of Trustees throughout the year and wish to thank them for entrusting me with the task to lead the organization as we serve the people of Zimbabwe.




Overview of WASH Infrastructure Provided by Africa AHEAD



In the past two years Africa AHEAD has been transformed into an integrated WASH NGO, with much more focus on infrastructure provision, including 18 piped water solar schemes, rehabilitation and drilling of boreholes, reconstruction and upgrading of school latrines and water supply, rehabilitation of Health Centers and even the construction of housing after the emergency prompted by Cyclone Idai. However, we retain our original vision that all infrastructure projects require a budget for community mobilisation through CHC to ensure sustainability of investments.





She now plans to buy more kitchen utensils so that she can lend them to other communities at a cost.'

'In pursuit of SDG 6, Chioangai Primary is one of the 3 schools that benefited from the piped water scheme project. Prior to the scheme the school relied on a community borehole situated 3km from the school. This led to high staff turnover as the conditions were unbearable. Students had to carry bottles of water to the school. Its all smiles now as water is readily available at the school premises.

Prevention of Covid 19 Campaign

An estimated quarter of a million people were reached through road shows in towns with accurate and appropriate information to reduce the spread of the COVID-19 and diarrheal diseases.

AA staff manned hand washing stations at bus termini to ensure all hands were clean before boarding the bus in Bulawayo, Chipinge, Harare, Mutare and Plumtree to prevent the transmission from urban to rural and ensure all had correct information on Covid 19.

UNICEF is supporting the areas of Gutu District that were affected by Hurricane Idai, which left a trail of broken homes latrines and other infrastructure in 2020.

Africa AHEAD has been rehabilitating boreholes so successfully that it has exceeded the targets providing safe water to 37,085 people against the target of 15,150 people representing a 245% achievement.

This was made possible by the massive community response which enabled more pump minders and water committees to be trained than anticipated, thanks to successful community mobilisaton through the CHCs.

Girls are often disadvantaged at school because they stay at home during menstruation each month, due to lack of washing facilities at school. By missing critical lessons each month they get behind in class. Therefore 'girl child-friendly latrines' with lockable doors and water, enable girls to the privacy that enables them to fully attend school.

The project entailed the refurbishment of 23 Health Care facilities across the country with improved access to critical WASH supplies and information for enhancing 'infection prevention and control' (IPC) measures in COVID-19 isolation wards as well ensuring there were hygienic toilets, hand washing and ablution facilities to contain infection.

Activities:

- IPC/WASH supplies (including posters) provided
- IPC training for health care workers and cleaning personnel
- WASH assessment for repair and rehabilitation at 23 facilities
- All water points at isolation facilities were repaired
- All sanitation facilities at isolation facilities were repaired
- All handwashing facilities at isolation facilities were repaired

Africa AHEAD partnered with Christian Aid in an immediate response to Covid 19 pandemic with the distribution of NFI & IEC materials. Although due to the emergency nature of the project period we had to forego our usual way of working through Community Health Clubs to ensure sustainability, but we nevertheless managed to do 18 hygiene awareness sessions.

Using the conventional Public Health Campaign method of roadshows Africa AHEAD mounted two public campaigns at Lyveve and Gwabalanda to inform public of the Covid 19 threat and how to manage the crisis.


Poster designs and messages crafted and submitted and approved. Health Messages for SMS were crafted and sent to 200,000 residents and two local radio stations had radio jingles broadcast in Ndebele and English with a listenership of 2.7 million weekly.

We provided an assessment of the whole community in the conventional emergency response method. Of the 1,200 households registered and the most vulnerable were registered to receive charity handouts which included 1,600 hand sanitizers and masks, bars of soap and buckets with taps for drinking water storage.

10 boreholes were assessed and fitted with new water tanks. All activities were done in collaboration with the Provincial Authority.

Comment: This is a truly integrated programme where WASH is integrated with Nutrition. It should form a model for other partners / donors looking to achieve a fully rounded intervention which addresses all the needs of the community using the AHEAD 4 stage approach: starting with hygiene & sanitation, then water, then livelihoods.

The project started with the training of **103 Community Health Workers** (87 women and 14 men) who then each started a Community Health Club in their village. In total 2,417 households were reached with strong response in terms of hygiene behaviour change. In total **2,325 people were reached through SMS**, so that those who could not attend the CHC health Promotion were alerted to the issues surrounding Covid.

At the same CHC villages **50** boreholes were rehabilitated and **3** new boreholes drilled in the most vulnerable areas, with **233** waterpoint committee members trained of which half were women (see front cover). Nutrition gardens were started enabling all CHC members to have better nutrition for their families.

Originally the project was to support those most affected by socio economic crisis and drought but with Covid additional aspects of the project included **emergency supply of Non Food Items kits (NFI) to 500** of the most vulnerable (a bucket, 20 litre jerry can, laundry soap and facemasks).

- Improving handwashing in the city in public places by providing hand wash facilities suitable for children & PLWA;
- 3. **Raising awareness** of the need for vaccination through public loud hailer
- 4. Rehabilitation of 35 boreholes enabling 12,776 households (63,880 people) in Nkulumane to have reliable access to safe drinking water .



The Community Health Clubs have enabled the City Authority to have better liaison with users to improve water provision, by metering water supply more effectively so as to raise funds to improve service delivery to city residents as well as update records on vulnerable members in the community with special needs.

This is the 3rd phase of support for a reticulated piped water scheme within the reach of 4 villages with 135 households (675 people) in 2 CHCs and a school of 465 pupils.

The borehole also serves the new AHEAD Resource Centre (ARC), which is planned as a demonstration site for 'best WASH practice', an initiative which will enable the local community as well as other Zimbabweans, practitioners in the region to learn technological skills and how to train Community Health Clubs in health and hygiene.

The next stage will see the local CHCs being transformed into FAN Clubs, with the growing Moringa trees using organic farming methods in nutrition & herb gardens and beekeeping.

A village committee has been established to maintain the pipeline with an agreement with the ARC to ensure ongoing water supply and collaboration with the surrounding community and school into the future.

The 'WASH Fit' Assessment is a survey tool for assessing if Health Centres and facilities are 'fit' for dealing with Covid patients. It is being developed by IMC and Unicef and piloted in Zimbabwe through ACF and Africa AHEAD. The project was a capacity building exercise for Health Centre personnel for IPC with WASH assessments, training, and hygiene promotion alongside the provision of supplies. This initiative has already resulted in 26 improved Health Facilities enabling stakeholders to access and monitor facilities over time. Africa AHEAD provided the training of both Health Centre staff and community. This trial was extended to 9 more isolation facilities in response to the pandemic.

21 CHC (10 in Chiredzi and 11 in Mwenezi) were started and this training triggered an increased demand for training beyond the villages of operation.

The demand for membership of CHCs could not be met due to the restrictions on the size of health club meetings under COVID-19 regulations. However, 10 extra emergency CHC (eCHC) emerged in Chiredzi rural, though under the same trained CBFs.

During the Covid 19 pandemic CHC members continued to meet in eCHC often taught by SMS with small group of people per CHC to ensure social distancing and with a shortened curriculum of only topics related to Covid 19 being taught.

Hygiene Behaviour Change

Monitoring of CHC progress towards adoption of the hygiene behaviour which had been promoted through CHC sessions with an end-line survey was done in Chiredzi rural and Mwenezi districts.

The Enhancing Learning and Research for Humanitarian Assistance (ELRHA) Project supported by Oxfam and ACF focused strengthening the humanitarian response.

The project was essentially a study which tested the Community Perceptions Tracker (CPT) in Lebanon and Zimbabwe (with Africa AHEAD as the implementing partner) to illustrate how adopting a systematic process which encourages implementing staff to actively listen to communities, track perceptions and then act on the trends that emerge, leading to more acceptable and relevant programming during the COVID-19 outbreak.

The CPT process provided humanitarian staff with real-time data on community perceptions and priorities which were then used to inform programme implementation and decision making.

Over two years perceptions were collected by Africa AHEAD by CMOs who were working in our project districts. From February 2022 Seventy five community health workers (CHWs) in seven districts were trained on the CPT Tool and are now collecting perceptions regularly.

CPT findings illustrate that routinely documenting 'Community perceptions' can add value to humanitarian responses during disease outbreaks as has been the case during the COVID-19 pandemic through improving the quality of community engagement and behaviour change communication programmes, especially minority groups such as people living with disability and Church groups resistant to Western Medicine who resist vaccination.

The project aimed to increase uptake of vaccination amongst vulnerable groups in Masvingo, Bulawayo and Manicaland.

Training Activities

- ◆ 425 Community Health Workers (365 females, 60 males) were trained to create awareness on Covid 19 and to encourage vaccination in their areas, conducting Covid 19 educations in their respective local areas.
- ◆ 78 (12 males; 66 females) Community Health Workers were trained on the collection of perceptions in Manicaland, Bulawayo and Masvingo provinces.
- ◆ 236 (63 males and 173 females) were trained from health care facility staff of various clinics and hospitals.

Vaccine demand creation was done by the following means:

Radio Broadcasts: 4 radio broadcasts were done in Bulawayo, 2 in Manicaland and 1 in Masvingo with massages to encourage full vaccine uptake.

Production of skits (drama): influential local artists produced skits in Manicaland, Masvingo and Bulawayo for different language groups, which was distributed in Masvingo with 235,351 viewers through YouTube and Facebook. As some people found it difficult to accept the vaccine, a 'barrier analysis' was done to establish the most important enablers that are likely to foster appropriate action amongst the target group's behavior towards the uptake of COVID 19 vaccines. This research is supported by the COVID-19 Hygiene Hub (hosted by LSTHM) and informed by ACF's Community Perception Tracker (CPT), a mobile tool to capture, analyse and understand the perceptions of communities during disease outbreaks.

Africa AHEAD was responsible for the first of a 4 stage project, the 'WASH and Health' component in which **293 community leaders were trained** (above). This provided the vehicle for ACF/NAZ, to address Food Security and Nutrition, Gender & Disaster Risk Reduction component - thus showing how the CHCs can be used across many sectors of development with our model.

CHCs were motivated to clean up their solid waste to improve their environment with weekly 'clean ups' in their respective areas well supported by Council (see below).

Emakhandeni Clinic in Bulawayo, with a catchment population of 34,876 people was renovated with provision of safe water and sanitation infrastructure.

Comment: For too long rural communities have been forced to rely on worn out handpumps that are often dysfunctional and far from home. Now solar powered pumps are more affordable and the rural areas are being supplied by this more sustainable technology & renewable source of energy.

Hardware without Software creates a Challenge of Sustainability

Before the intervention in both Chiredzi and Mwenezi communities endured long walking distances to access safe water or relied on unsafe shallow wells. This program brought safe water supply into the heart of each village, but there was no support for Community Health Clubs so as to ensure the rehabilitated WASH facilities would be valued. As a result we found another partner, OXFAM to provide support for community mobilization in the second phase of the project, as described on the next page 12. Communities were organized and contributed their labour in the digging of trenches from the borehole to the villages often over ten kilometers distance (see below).

As one of the boreholes proved plentiful it was decided to pipe water to 20 villages and therefore Community Health Clubs were established to ensure full participation.

The response from this remote area of Zimbabwe was outstanding with **479 members** (75 male, 404 women) who **contributed their labour** in the digging over 10 kms of trenches to enable the two piped Water Schemes reach 970 households and 1,827 pupils.

Three school health clubs have also been established with a membership of 98 (46M; 52F).

Comment: The objective of supplying safe water is to decrease diarrhoea but this cannot be achieved unless water is hygienically stored. With the training in the health clubs, the level of hygiene and safe storage of food and water was dramatically improved by 'model kitchens' to a standard seldom seen in Africa.

International Medical Corps (IMC) pioneers of WASH FIT Tool have partnered with ACF and Africa AHEAD to conduct an assessment of 26 Health Centers, 13 in Mutare, 8 in Chimanimani and 5 in Chipinge to ascertain the standard of WASH facilities and assess what needs to be done.

Health Centers generally are in a state of disrepair with minimal sanitation and poor levels of ablution facilities. Five workshops were held which resulted in **56 Government staff** from the National up to the district level (**127% over target**) being trained. After the training **all three districts adopted the 'WASH Fit' tool** to be used throughout their districts. Based on the findings from the WASH Fit assessment this second phase is supporting the upgrading of 15 Health Centers with more hygienic facilities so they are able to deal with the Covid 19 crisis effectively.

This project seeks to address such issues to do with water supply in health care facilities, including water storage, pump or borehole repair, stand-alone solar-powered borehole pumps, solar-powered water heating units, sanitation works (installation of flush toilets, shower, septic tank, soak away, and plumbing works) as well as hand hygiene (installation of handwashing basins with elbow taps and plumbing works). In Mutare District, two Health Centers will be rehabilitated, as well as eight in Chipinge, and two in Chimanimani.

Africa AHEAD is to be responsible for the WASH component with the objective to increase household access to water, hygiene and sanitation. 48 Boreholes will be rehabilitated, and 6 new boreholes drilled to service piped water schemes and the construction of 2 weirs.

This is expected to ensure at least **13,500** people have access to a adequate and clean water supply as well as improving access to water and sanitation infrastructure in communities and key local institutions.

Though Community Health Clubs knowledge and key hygiene practices will be improved, to ensure safe and sustainable behavior change.

Restoring economic sustainability after COVID 19 with Agriculture

Responsible water management for agriculture and livestock production will also be supported.

Key WASH activities will be integrated with agricultural production and linked to nutrition to secure healthy environments and positive nutrition outcomes, while improving safe and secure access to WASH services to reduce health risks and reduce the workload of women and children.

The intervention also focuses on strengthening response capacity of local health centres and hygiene systems.

Crucially, the project will also analyze early warning information access and build upon existing systems.

Radio Broadcasts for Covid awareness

Africa AHEAD hosts weekly Radio sessions on local radio, with phone-in questions and answer sessions, as well as discussions from experts in Covid in order to inform the public and convince them of the need for vaccination and compliance with covid restrictions, with skits to make the message clear. The Campaign had an estimated reach of 5 million people.

International Training online Courses



With the Covid pandemic it was impossible to travel to train other NGOs wanting to start Community Health Clubs. Thanks to the support from **Vitol Foundation**, we were able to develop a **Learning Management Platform** on our website www.africaahead.com. The AAA Director of Training, Dr. Waterkeyn uploaded over 500 visual aids, organised into a 4-part Training Programme: Introduction, Planning, Monitoring & Facilitation of Community Health Clubs. Participants can now access 50 online sessions, downloading all Training material from our dedicated platform.

Participants:

From October 2020 - December 2021 Dr. Waterkeyn assisted by Julia Pantoglou, assisted by other Africa AHEAD experts and Associates, trained **180 participants from 14 different countries**. Following the training, NGOs were able to start up Community Health Clubs started in two sites in South Sudan (Samaritan's Purse), in Kenya (Global Health Connection) and in Malawi (Healthy Lives International (HLI) and Transform International (TI) both funded by Rotary. The successful replication of CHC through virtual training showed that online dissemination is a feasible substitute for the hands-on workshops.





